Hello from all of us at the North Hempstead Animal Shelter (and "woof, woof," say the shelter dogs)! We miss seeing everyone's faces down here, but we are beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel. Although the shelter hasn't completely returned to all of its pre-pandemic programs and operations, that hasn't hindered the success of our most important goal—finding homeless dogs their perfect "furever" homes. We are continuing to facilitate adoptions by appointment, have increased our social media presence, and are still regularly doing television spots to feature the dogs, such as News 12's Paws and Pals! (see Diamond below).

The Shelter Connection President, Dr. Bob Slifkin, wrote a letter to bring everyone up to speed with the volunteer group's happenings:

## President's Letter-

As with many aspects of our everyday lives the pandemic demanded a major change in shelter activities, including volunteer activities. For a short time, during the worst of the viral activity in New York, the shelter was completely closed to the public. In June, the shelter re-opened with limited hours and dogs could be seen only by appointment. When the Town and the shelter staff felt comfortable that it was safe, outdoor dog handling by our volunteers resumed in October. In the fall, the shelter reopened to pre-pandemic hours but adoptions are still by appointment only. (continued on page 3)

# The Results Are In!

Meet two of our adorable adoptables currently awaiting their forever homes at the shelter! We couldn't quite put our finger on what breeds these two mutts may be a mix of- so we decided to figure it out! Learning about a dog's breeds can be very helpful to understand certain behaviors and traits, and in turn create a more profound relationship with better communication between you and your pooch. We used Wisdom Panel Essential kits to obtain these results:

The boxer is likely where he gets his build from, while the Chow explains his longer coat and purple-tinged tongue! The

Pointers and Hounds are common mixes in Georgia where he is from, although we have to admit, we don't quite see the Papillon.... Jimbo is seeking an active home that has experience with training. He gets along well with other dogs and probably would love a companion to help tire him out!

For lack of a better guess, we dubbed 2 year old Bill a Shepherd Mix when he arrived here from Georgia, based on his markings and ear shape. Lo and behold- Bill is 0% shepherd! His main breeds comprise of guard-type dogs, but the substantial mix of Labrador, Australian Cattle dog, and Malamute all contribute to his unique look. Bill can take some time to become comfortable in a new setting, but once he is he becomes a playful and affectionate guy. Bill will need an experienced home, ideally with another mild mannered dog, that has the patience to show him the world is not so scary!

Due to all of these changes the way that our Adoption Advisors work had to be redefined. Until more is known about the protection offered by the vaccines, we cannot ask our volunteers to put themselves at risk to meet and greet the public at the shelter. For this same reason, adoption advisor classes cannot be held until these questions are answered.

Thanks to funding from The Shelter Connection, the Rescue and Mend-A-Paw programs continue. The shelter has accepted several great dogs from over-crowded shelters in Georgia and Texas, some of which are heartworm positive and could not be treated in their home shelters. The Shelter Connection continues to fund purchase of better food, special food if needed, beds, bones, treats and anything else needed for the safety, comfort, and well-being of the dogs at the shelter.

With this pandemic many families in our community have faced an economic crisis and some are having difficulty feeding their pets. Long Island Cares (www.licares.org) supplies food to about 30 agencies in the Town of North Hempstead for their food pantries but has not been able to supply pet food. The

Shelter Connection has agreed to supply funding so that pet food, as needed, is regularly delivered to the food pantries along with human food. Hopefully, this will enable families to keep their pets and they will not have to make a choice between feeding themselves or their pets.

Everything that we have accomplished, or are doing now, comes because of the support from our wonderful community of animal lovers. For our volunteers and the families that our efforts are helping- THANK YOU!!


Tell Tails Spring 2021

# 👺 Kind Kids: Jesse Ryan 👺

Eagle Scout Jesse Ryan, representing Troop #201 in Mineola approached us wanting us to be the recipient of his eagle scout project. Jesse chose the shelter because he loves animals, especially dogs, and he wanted his project to have a positive impact to help the lives of the shelter dogs at the shelter. With the perks of having a beautiful, wooded property and nature trail for the dogs to enjoy also comes the burden of mosquitoes. In the summer the nature trail can become almost intolerable for some because of them, and mosquitoes are a super vector for



disease, including heartworm disease in dogs. Jesse and shelter staff together brainstormed on ideas to assuage this issue and came up with the idea of constructing bat boxes to help increase the resident population of native bats. Did you know that a single bat can eat up to 1,000 mosquitoes per hour? Having more bats on the property can certainly help the comfort of both humans and shelter dogs, alike!





Jesse recruited other scouts and family members looking to put in some community service hours and began fundraising for the project by building extra bat boxes and selling them locally. After sufficient funds were raised, on April 10th, after the skies cleared, Jesse and his team installed four bat boxes on various, suitable areas of the property. Believe it or not, there are many specific criteria to properly mounting a bat box- they should not be placed on trees due to increased predation and too much shade, they should have 6 -8 hours of sun exposure a day, and they should be no further than 1/4 mile from a water source (thankfully, we have a babbling creek that runs along the property!) In addition to the bat boxes, Jesse and his team erected a new 20 ft flagpole on the property to replace the old one that had been knocked down by a truck years ago. Now our flag can proudly fly!



Jesse would like to thank various businesses that either donated or provided discounts, including Mineola Flag Company in Lynbrook, Sherwin-Williams in New Hyde Park, Riverhead Building Supply in Mineola, and Home Depot in Westbury. We would like to thank Jesse and his whole team for being so hard-working (they did this in one day!) and dedicating their time to positively impacting the dogs (and the staff and volunteers!) lives here at the shelter. We can't wait for the bats to start moving in!
